# **Our Current Efforts: Community Area Planning**

The Charlotte Future 2040 Comprehensive Plan and 2040 Policy Map, were adopted in June 2021 and March 2022, respectively. They were developed to provide clear direction for how we want to grow as an inclusive and equitable city.





Now that the **Charlotte Future 2040 Comprehensive Plan** and **2040 Policy Map** are adopted, the Long Range
Planning Division will work to implement the plan's vision
by developing community area plans that provide more
detailed strategies and recommendations for growth and
development.

Community Area Plans provide detailed methods and recommendations regarding place types (how land will be used - residential, commercial, etc.), built-form (the function, shape and configuration of buildings as well as their relationship to streets and open spaces), transportation, infrastructure, parks, recreation, open space, and facilities for sub-geographies of the City.



The purpose of Community Area Plans is to engage and unite neighborhoods to plan their own communities within a framework that efficiently and effectively uses the resources available to ensure the entire City has neighborhood level input and guidance.





















# **Community Area Planning Phases**

2023

There are five phases in the Community Area Planning process. The first two phases occurred in 2023, with the remaining phases occurring this year and beyond.


Phase 1
Set The Stage

Phase 1: Set the Stage focused on understanding each community's needs for access to housing, jobs, goods and services, and environmental impacts.



Phase 2: Create Great Places featured the review of place type designations to ensure they address needs for more access to housing, jobs, goods, services, and amenities and fewer impacts.

Phase 5: Review & Adoption, will occur in 2025.


# **Community Area Planning Expected Outcomes**

The process is focused on 14 geographies, except for Uptown, due to the recent adoption of the **Charlotte Center City Vision Plan** in 2021. The Community Area Planning approach organizes the City into 14 geographies so that engagement and the development of area plans can occur citywide, simultaneously. This ensures an equitable and efficient process. The expected outcomes for the remaining geographies include 14 community area plans with:

- Illustrative development concepts for the focus areas
- Maps and lists of improved or new infrastructure and amenity needs in focus areas
- List of revised or new private and/or public programs
- Implementation strategies

Place Type changes recommended within the Community Area Plans will be integrated into the citywide **Charlotte Future 2040 Policy Map**.

Area plans will be used by city staff, appointed, and elected officials in various decision-making processes such as future work programs, prioritization and budgeting, and development proposals.

# **Community Area Planning Engagement Summary**

The Community Area Planning engagement strategy includes three types of tactics: constant, coordinated, and collaborative to ensure an equitable and inclusive process. Staff constantly developed in-person, virtual, electronic and print media to engage with the community. Focus groups, workshops, library office hours, and cultural events are coordinated to connect with the community, and appointed and elected officials.

# **2040 Planning Academy**

2040 Planning Academy is a program that provides the opportunity to empower participants with the knowledge necessary to be engaged and involved in future planning processes in Charlotte. The program was developed in 2016 with the goals to:



### **EDUCATE**

Educate residents about the role planning plays in building communities.



#### **EMPOWER**

Empower residents to effectively participate in future planning processes.



## UNITE

Build relationships between staff, participants & neighborhoods.



### 2023 VIRTUAL PROGRAM

The 2023 session program was FULLY VIRTUAL, FREE, & OPEN TO ALL with an average of **49** participants over **4** sessions & over **150** YouTube views for the first session & average of **50** YouTube views of the remaining three sessions.







### A LOOK AHEAD

Staff is exploring ways to enhance the program to reach more participants, including incorporating youth engagement, and inperson and virtual sessions.

## **Stakeholder Commissions**

Guidance from the **Charlotte Future 2040 Comprehensive Plan** prompted the creation of three commissions to help implement some of the goals of the Plan. The Plan Implementation Team provides staff support and resources where necessary for these commissions.
